

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As we come to the end of 2020, it has been a year like no other and I would like to acknowledge that for parents/carers and children with SEND things have been particularly challenging. There has been a great deal of creative working to support children learning from home and to continue to support activity such as short breaks. As we move into 2021, I hope that much of what we have learned will continue to be useful in the future. Many of our services have continued throughout this pandemic, all have had to adapt and take different shape, but our officers have worked extremely hard to make sure we are providing a good service. Despite the pandemic a lot has happened in the last couple of months and I just wanted to reflect on some of that work.

In October, we submitted our written statement of action in response to Ofsted's report. We have since found out that this proposal has been accepted by Ofsted and can continue the good

practices, we are putting in place to improve quality of our service.

Our SEN Support handbook also launched in November, during which time it had been downloaded over 200 times. The handbook provides details of the support available for both parents and schools to assist children and young people and can be found on the Local Offer website.

We have been working closely with the Parent Carer Forum on processes such as the redesign of our new Education, Health and Care Plan and EHC Needs Assessment Request Form. The new documentation will be rolled out as new EHC Plans are issued and is clearer to understand and more directly reflect the child's or young person's voice and their aspirations of what they would like to achieve.

On top of working full-time and caring for their autistic son, the family all still find time to support the Police Cadets.

Matt says:

"I get a real buzz out of teaching the cadets about policing and helping them work towards a career in the police. Being a cadet offers young adults the chance to see that with the right attitude and direction, they can better themselves and have a good life and career.

"As a father of a disabled child, I'm a big believer that every child, regardless of the barriers they may face, should be offered the same opportunities and I truly believe we offer that."

When Matt started volunteering four years ago, he enjoyed it so much that he persuaded his wife, Sarah, to sign up as a Cadet Leader too. **He said**

"We love it so much that we even use our respite care time for our son to attend Cadets with our daughter, it has become a family event for us."

Grace plans to join her parents as a Cadet Leader when she turns 18 and is hoping for a career with the force too.

What is the library like now?

Council-run libraries across the county reopened their doors for browsing again on 2 December, but what is it like visiting the library now?

Booking an appointment is no longer required at most libraries, so visitors are able to pop in as normal during opening hours. There may be a short queue outside as we're still limiting numbers to maintain social distancing but staff will be on hand to welcome you to the library and let you in.

You'll be asked to sanitise your hands before entering and wear a mask inside the library, unless you are exempt. We're asking everyone to borrow books using the self-serve kiosks, to limit face-to-face contact and protective screens are in place. Find out more about what to expect when you visit the library.

Use a computer at the library PC usage has also returned and you may book a one-hour slot at www.leicestershire.gov.uk/book-a-computer up to two weeks in advance. Computers and workspaces are cleaned in between sessions and only one person may use the computer during each session. If you're unable to book online, please ask a member of staff when you visit about booking a PC.

Click and collect

We know that some residents may still feel hesitant about visiting the library, in case of crowds. Our Click and Collect service enables those library customers to tell us their local library and favourite authors or genres. Librarians will then hand-pick a selection of books or audiobooks they think customers will enjoy and give them a call to advise a quiet time for collection.

X Factor Winner Sam Bailey has given her support to adults with learning disabilities to record Do They Know Its Christmas. The song introduced by Sam, has been produced in conjunction with Meadow Barn View, a skills centre for adults with learning disabilities based in Whitwick, Wigston Amateur Operatic Society and disabled adults throughout the County who have used sign language to interpret the song.

Funded by the National Lottery and supported by Leicestershire County Council, the song is part of of a bigger project called MY MIND. This is a support package of online activities, loaned out ipads and a new App designed to help adults with learning disabilities who have become isolated as a result of Covid 19.

Recent figures from the Office of National Statistics (ONS) have revealed that disabled people, while only making up 16% of the population accounted for 6 out of every 10 deaths between March and July. These figures signal that disabled people have been disproportionately affected by the experience of lockdown and the pandemic.

Speaking about her involvement Sam Bailey said, 'I am very very excited to be involved in this, we just wanted to make people happy and put a smile on people's faces'

Owner of Meadow Barn, Lynda Toon MBE, said

'Its been a difficult year for all of us, but especially so for adults with learning disabilities. They need routine and structure to their lives and struggle to thrive when that is removed. When we told people that Sam Bailey was supporting this song, we were overwhelmed by the positive

response from people across the County wanting to be involved. It has been wonderful to work in partnership with Leicestershire City and County Council colleagues in Health, Social Care the Voluntary, Private Sector, carers, local communities and people who use services in creating this song. It is just one piece of the jigsaw in our collaborative approach to breaking down barriers and developing creative ways in which people with learning disabilities and/or autism and their carers can come together to be heard...Every Voice Counts! A very big thank you to everyone.'

SEND Joint Commissioning Strategy Consultation

Leicester, Leicestershire and Rutland Councils and the Clinical Commissioning Groups (CCG's) for the area are engaging on a new, draft Joint Commissioning Strategy for SEND.

The strategy contains a high-level vision for joint commissioning "we will work together across Leicester, Leicestershire and Rutland to improve the outcomes for children and young people with SEND' and a set of priorities

for the focus of joint work in the coming 3 years.

Views are being sought from anyone interested in the strategy and joint working around SEND, including children and young people, parents and carers, schools and colleges, early years settings and employers.

We expect to have more conversations once this strategy is in place, asking people to help us shape and co-produce services as we work through our action plan.
